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his Activity Report sets out the actions carried out by the Spanish Network of Cities for Climate during 2019 and the first quarter of 2020, according to the work plan set out in the Resolution on the grant under article 22.2.C) of the General Subsidies Law between the Ministry for Ecological Transition and the Spanish Federation of Municipalities and Provinces, to promote and facilitate the development of local actions on climate change.



1. COP 25, CHILE-MADRID

On November 1st 2019, the Government Panel of the Conference of the Parties of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) accepted the proposal of the Government of Chile for holding the 2019 Climate Summit (COP25) in Madrid. Since then, the Government of Spain worked to ensure the successful organisation of this international event, giving priority to the participation of the greater number of delegates, as well as the presence and participation of civil society.

COP25 took place on December 2nd-13th - 2019 in Madrid, under Chile's Presidency, being the Spanish Government responsible of its organisation.

From COP21, when the Paris Agreement was signed, up until now, the important role of Local Governments in fighting climate change has been clearly shown. Therefore, when the Spanish Federation of Municipalities and Provinces (FEMP) learned that COP25 would be held in Spain, it contacted the Ministry for Ecological Transition to guarantee the participation of Local Governments and highlight the actions that they were undertaking in this field.

To this effect, the Network held three events in the Green Zone of the COP, with the participation of local leaders with extensive experience fighting against climate change. Besides, FEMP had a stand at which municipal initiatives on mitigation and adaptation were presented, and different municipal campaigns were proposed to be undertaken by Local Governments.

1.1 WORKDAYS

1.2 STAND OF THE SPANISH NETWORK OF CITIES FOR CLIMATE

The Government of Spain, once assuming the celebration of COP25, established the objective of achieving the Summit with greater social participation as a priority. To this effect, it established an application form so that Local Governments, institutions and non-governmental organisations could present their initiatives for fighting climate change during the COP, receiving around one thousand proposals.

Receiving an enormous number of requests for participation, the Ministry for Ecological Transition asked the FEMP to coordinate and manage Spanish Local Governments requests. For that purpose, it established a space in the Green Zone where these presentations could be held.

At the end of November, FEMP informed all Local Governments of the possibility of participating at its stand, encouraging them to develop other actions in the framework of COP₂₅.

The presentations at the stand were organised based on the issue addressed:

Energy efficiency
Sustainable building
Sustainable mobility
Reduction of emissions
Circular economy
Nature-based solutions
Adaptation to climate change

Other organisations also participated at the stand, showing their interest in presenting their actions to Local Governments.

In turn, FEMP presented the Local Strategy on Circular Economy and the Municipal Green Infrastructure Guide.

1.3 LOCAL CAMPAIGNS

On the occasion of the celebration of COP25 in Madrid on December 2nd-13th, a large number of Local Governments joined the joint actions proposed by the Spanish Network of Cities for Climate and undertook actions with their citizens:

• LIGHTS OUT: It was proposed to turn off the lighting of the facades of the most emblematic buildings or Christmas lighting in the framework of the COP. The action was carried out on Saturday the 7th of December from 20:00 to 20:30 hours and was supported by over thirty Local Governments.

Christmas lighting was also turned off at many Town Halls, or its lighting was postponed until the end of the COP.

- PEOPLE'S MARCH FOR THE CLIMATE: It was proposed to carry out a people's march for citizens of all ages. Each Local Entity chose the date to carry it out.
- A TREE FOR EUROPE: This action arose from a proposal by the President of the European Parliament. Participating Mayors committed to planting a tree in their municipality before the 5th of June 2020, bringing visibility to the importance of sustainable development at local level and involving young people in the decision making processes for sustainability. Over thirty City Councils joined this initiative through the promotion carried out by the FEMP.

2. 13TH ASSEMBLY AND DISCUSSION PANEL

The 13th Assembly of the Network was held on the 9th of March at the headquarters of the FEMP (Madrid). It was, attended by 124 representatives of Local Governments, 79 of them with voting rights.

The Assembly was chaired by Juan Espadas, Mayor of Seville and President of the Network, accompanied by the 2nd Vice President of the Network and Mayor of Gavà, Raquel Sánchez, and Valvanera Ularqui, General Director of the Spanish Office for Climate Change. Francisco Salado, 1st Vice President of the Network and President of Málaga Provincial Government, was unable to attend.

The President welcomed the attendees and expressed his satisfaction at presiding the Network in a new legislature, then he proceeded with the agenda. The minutes of the previous Assembly, held in Santa Cruz de Tenerife on November 8th 2018, were approved, together with the 19 accession requests received, with which the Network became constituted by 332 Local Entities and two Observation Governments, representing a total of 30,369,619 inhabitants.

The appointment of one member remained pending, which will be approved by the Governing Board at its next meeting.

Aftewards, the actions carried out by the Spanish Network of Cities for Climate during 2018 and 2019 were presented, set out in the respective Activity Reports.

The Assembly ended with an extensive discussion among attendees on the work plan to be carried out during 2020.

In addition to the actions already being carried out, such as the Carbon Footprint Calculation, the Awards for Local Good Practices on Climate Change, and the Climate Change School Campaign, activities derived from the implementation of Pilot Projects , which were approved in the 2017 Assembly, were incorporated as well as those carried out by members of the Network. These can be summarized as: energy (self-consumption), electric mobility and charging points, waste (circular economy and biowaste), adaptation to climate change (agriculture, coast, etc.), etc., taking into account the differences between small/medium municipalities compared with large municipalities in all of these aspects.

The Assembly ended with the statement by Valvanera Ulargui, General Director of the Spanish Office for Climate Change, who conveyed to the attendees the importance of the Spanish Network of Cities for Climate to fight against climate change, as well as the measures that the Government is undertaking under the Climate Emergency Declaration.



Held at the end of the Assembly and moderated by Juan Espadas, President of the Network and Mayor of Seville, the discussion panel addressed how to undertake the energy transition, as well as the changes necessary in mobility to progress toward the decarbonisation of our cities.

Accompanying him in the debate were Pedro Prieto, Director of Energy Conservation and Efficiency of the Institute for Energy Diversification and Conservation, and Eduardo González, Subdirector General of Coordination of Actions against Climate Change of the Spanish Office for Climate Change.

Due to the travel restrictions related to COVID-19 pandemic, Germán Esteban, Head of International Relations of the European Commission, who was going to present first-hand the main lines of action of the European Green Deal, was unable to attend. In his absence, Eduardo González presented attendees with the milestones established by the European Commission for the next five years to achieve a climate-neutral European Union by 2050. He underlined that in order to follow the path to fulfilment of the decarbonisation goal in 2050, it is necessary to increase the ambitiousness of the 2030 objectives, therefore reviewing many European Directives.

In turn, Pedro Prieto explained the changes the energy system has to address in order to achieve a climate-neutral economy in 2050. These affect not only large producers, but also citizens, cities, small producers and municipal structures. Additionally, he expressed the need to increase generation of renewable energy, being the role of City Councils of great importance as promoters and coordinators.

He also addressed the need to take actions in the mobility field, which currently amounts to 50% of the energy bill in homes, with a high dependence on fossil fuels and no easy alternatives to increase electrification. City Councils may enforce a modal shift; for example, establishing low emission zones and reviewing their public transport fleets and their routes.

The European Union has estimated that 1 trillion euros of investment are required in 10 years to undertake all these changes, which highlights the need to review the current scenario in which the expenditure ceiling impedes Local Governments from making investments which are required to progress in the decarbonisation of cities and to fulfil the climate-neutral objectives set out by the Spanish Government and the European Union.

3. SCHOOL CAMPAIGN ON CLIMATE CHANGE

Since 2015 the School Campaign on Climate Change has been carried out with the objective of providing municipalities with tools to raise awareness of primary school students on what they and their families can do to reduce their contribution to climate change.

Due to the demand of Local Governments belonging to the Network, the Campaign has expanded its content of both physical and digital materials.

During this edition, in addition to republishing content from previous editions, new materials were designed in order to highlight the role that energy efficiency plays in the fight against climate change.

To this effect, a new educational video was created, in which Klimatea, an animated robot, explains through everyday examples what energy efficiency is.

A game was also developed, aimed at reinforcing knowledge about the importance of energy efficiency, together with more activities for providing information on actions that help to fight against climate change and that are beneficial for our planet.



In this edition of the Campaign, information was expanded on the importance of separating waste for recycling, incorporating the separation of organic matter for its reuse, thereby avoiding many emissions in landfills.

All these activities are compiled in a Guide for teachers which explains the content and objectives of the Campaign, together with proposals of activities to carry out in the classroom. Additionally, the Guide specifies whether the materials are available in Spanish or English.

4. SIXTH REPORT ON LOCAL POLICIES TO FIGHT **CLIMATE CHANGE**

Since 2007, this Report has been drawn up to present and disseminate the policies and actions carried out in municipalities belonging to the Spanish Network of Cities for Climate in the fight against climate change.

This Report shows the efforts that Local Governments of the Network are making to face the impacts of climate change, demonstrating their commitment to applying policies and measures on a daily basis.

In the elaboration of this Report, the participation of Local Entities of the Network was essential, providing all the necessary information to show the actions they were carrying out to reduce their greenhouse gas emissions in the fields of mobility, energy efficiency, renewable energy and urban development.

Among the measures to adapt to climate change implemented by Local Governments, the Nature-Based Solutions (NBS) must be highlighted, which are also incorporated in this report.

Likewise, the Report includes the work carried out by Provincial Governments, which play a very important role in fighting climate change, coordinating and promoting the application of policies for mitigation and adaptation in small municipalities.



5. PROJECT FOR CALCULATION, REGISTRATION AND REDUCTION OF MUNICIPAL CARBON FOOTPRINTS

Since 2014, the Spanish Network of Cities for Climate has promoted the calculation and registry of the Carbon Footprints of its Local Governments, in order to reduce their greenhouse gas emissions.

To this end, the Network provides support to the members interested in calculating the carbon footprint of their premises and facilities, in order to be able to register them in the Registry of Carbon Footprints and Carbon Dioxide Offsetting and Absorption Projects of the Ministry for Ecological Transition (MITECO).

The results are compiled in reports which are created annually. Municipal technicians are trained so that in following years they can calculate and register the footprint of their City Council autonomously.

A report is created evaluating the situation of over twenty Local Entities participating in the calculation of their carbon footprint and the design of plans for reduction of CO2 emissions. For this purpose, the work tool provided by MITECO was used, which greatly facilitates the calculation of the footprint and the presentation of results.

The year selected for the carbon footprint calculation was 2018 in most cases, although some used 2017, depending on the data provided by each Local Government. The project also allowed official recognition of the results by the Ministry through the registration of the footprints calculated in the Registry.

In this edition, the experiences of the City Councils of León and Valladolid were presented: both initially had the support of the Network for calculating their first carbon footprint, subsequently making the calculation and registration with their own resources.

Carbon Footprint Calculation training module

On February 13th 2020, a Carbon Footprint training module was held in Madrid. It was not possible to respond to all the registration requests received, as the course was mainly practical and personalized, which limited the capacity to a small group of attendees.

Cristina Villalón, Sustainable Mobility Technician of León City Council, presented her experience in the Carbon Footprint calculation of this city over several years. She highlighted the difficulty of compiling the invoices with the data necessary for the calculation for the first time, but encouraged technicians to undertake this work, the main benefit of which is to provide objective data on the consumption and emissions of municipal facilities.

She also explained the different Carbon Footprint Registration Sections, particularly those dedicated to absorption and offsetting projects, in order to encourage City Councils to use these mechanisms or tools to reduce the impact of their greenhouse gas emissions.

María José Ruiz de Villa, Director of the Energy Agency of Valladolid, in addition to presenting her experience in the footprint calculation and registration of this city over several years and obtaining the "reduction" seal, explained the projects that Valladolid City Council had presented for offsetting emissions and the process that this involved.

The course ended with the explanation of how the carbon footprint of municipal facilities is calculated feeding the data of a case study on the calculator designed by the Spanish Office for Climate Change for calculation of the footprint. It was possible to analyse the difficulties which arise to feed the information compiled into the calculator.



PUBLICATION COMPILING THE ACTIONS OF THE NETWORK

This publication compiles the activities carried out by the Spanish Network of Cities for Climate since its creation in 2005.

The Network has even since supported the Local Governments to achieve their emissions reduction goals and to adapt to the effects of climate change. Thus it has become the main interlocutor on climate change policies with other networks and agents working in this field at national and European level.

In order to disseminate activities of the Network during COP25 to local representatives of other countries, a version in English was produced.
